Westmount, November, 2010 – British Columbia student and Houston, B.C. resident Bradley Lecomte has been awarded the Caterpillar & its Canadian Dealers Scholarship for mining engineering.

Mr. Lecomte is a student in Mining Engineering at the University of British Columbia (UBC). His professors consider him as a prominent leader amongst his peers. He is both outstanding technically and academically. Moreover, he is deeply committed to a career in mining and he is grounded in the full realization of what mining offers as a profession. In fact, Bradley Lecomte believes that the mining industry has immense potential and that, as a mining engineer, he will have a rewarding position.

In his application for the award, he stated that since elementary school, he has been interested in mining, especially since he first toured the Huckleberry mine, outside of his hometown, Houston in British Columbia. In the summer, he was selected for a job driving one of the vehicles at the Huckleberry mine. He learned a great deal about how a mine works from an operations view point. These valuable field experiences will help him solve the engineering challenges that he will face when he makes major decisions later on in his career.
